Background Knowledge	Activity 1: Slideshow introduces background knowledge about the history of the Campeche chair, its roots in Spanish Colonialism, and George Macculloch's Campeche chair.

This section explores the Macculloch families through three aspects of their life: cultures and customs, enslavement at Macculloch Hall, and travel. Students are asked to do outside research about some aspect of Campeche chairs in Activity #3. Depending on the grade level and experience researching, teachers can substitute providing the sources and asking the students to read them. In Activity #7, students are asked to write a museum label about the Campeche chair.
